NFL Landscape:

Upgrade Confirmed: The Cowboys' new-look defense recorded four sacks, an elite 55.1% pass rush win rate, and an interception. Quinnen Williams was dominant, with 1.5 sacks, five quarterback hits, seven pressures, and a tackle for loss.

Ja'Marr Chase suspended one game for spitting on Jalen Ramsey. The incident occurred in Cincinnati's 34-12 loss to Pittsburgh on Sunday. Chase is appealing the suspension, which is for "an act contrary to the generally understood principles of sportsmanship." If the suspension is upheld, Chase will miss the Bengals' upcoming game against the Patriots. Besides Chase, the Bengals have Tee Higgins (35-544-7), Andrei Iosivas (19-256-1), and Mitchell Tinsley (3-49-1) at receiver.

Falcons lose Penix for season; London out indefinitely Michael Penix will miss the rest of the season with a left knee injury that includes damage to his ACL. Penix's other knee, the right one, has already been surgically repaired twice due to ACL tears in college. Penix was in the midst of a mostly disappointing season. Across nine games (3-6 record), he completed 60.1% of passes for 1,982 yards (220 per game), nine touchdowns, and three interceptions. Kirk Cousins will finish out the season as starter. In three appearances, he has completed 32 of 52 passes (61.5%) for 250 yards, no touchdowns, and no interceptions.

Drake London has a knee injury (PCL sprain) and is out indefinitely. PCL sprains are typically two-to-three-week injuries, though they can extend beyond that. Ricky Pearsall sprained his PCL in Week 4 and returned in Week 11. London's injury should lead to more targets for Kyle Pitts (47-434-1), Bijan Robinson (47-506-2), and Darnell Mooney (16-224).

Davis Mills is on track for another start. CJ Stroud remains in the concussion protocol and is unlikely to be cleared in time for Thursday's game against Buffalo. In two starts this season (2-0 record), Mills is averaging 283 passing yards, 2.0 touchdowns, and 0.5 interceptions per game. In seven starts this season (3-4 record), Stroud is averaging 232 passing yards, 1.6 touchdowns, and 0.7 interceptions per game. This excludes the start he was concussed in.

In starts with Mills, Nico Collins is averaging 12.5 targets, 8.0 catches, and 114 yards per game. In starts with Stroud, he is averaging 7.7 targets, 4.3 catches, and 57 yards per game.

Jets bench Justin Fields, to start Tyrod Taylor. Aaron Glenn announced that Taylor will start against the Ravens this week. In three games (0-1 record as starter), Taylor has accounted for 459 yards (379 passing, 80 rushing), three touchdowns, and three interceptions. He's completed 62.3% of his passes. In nine games (2-7 record as starter), Justin Fields accounted for 1,642 yards (1,259 passing, 383 rushing), 11 touchdowns, and one interception. He completed 62.7% of his passes. Fields signed a two-year, \$40 million contract in March. The future is that New York will acquire a new quarterback — via trade, free agency, or the draft — this upcoming offseason. The organization has five first-round picks in the next two years.

Last Week's Games

Cowboys beat Raiders 33-16

Cowboys Dak Prescott throws 4 TDs, defense rebounds in 33-16 win over Raiders. Dak Prescott was in top form, completing 25 of 33 (76%) for 268 yards, four touchdowns, and no interceptions. George Pickens (9-144-1) and CeeDee Lamb (5-66-1) were excellent.

Raiders QB Geno Smith (27/42, 238, 1, 1) was ineffective, while Ashton Jeanty rushed for just seven yards on six carries. The Raiders totaled just 237 yards on 58 plays (4.1 per).

Eagles beat Lions 16-9

QB Jalen Hurts accounted for 166 yards (135 passing, 31 rushing), one touchdown, and no interceptions. He completed 14/28 (50%). RB Saquon Barkley rushed for 83 yards on 26 carries (3.2 ypc). The Eagles' elite defense has allowed just 16 points in its last two games.

Detroit QB Jared Goff was very inaccurate, completing just 14/37 (38%) for 255 yards, one touchdown, and one interception. RB Jahmyr Gibbs was a bright spot, totaling 146 scrimmage yards (39 rushing, 107 receiving) on 16 touches (9.1 ypt). The Lions went 3/13 on third downs and 0/5 on fourth downs — which is not a great look for HC/play caller Dan Campbell.

Broncos beat Chiefs 22-19

Denver QB Bo Nix completed 24/37 (65%) for 295 yards, no touchdowns, and no interceptions. His top targets were WR Troy Franklin (4-48) and WR Pat Bryant (5-82). K Will Lutz made 5/5 of field goals, including a 35-yard game-winner.

Kansas City QB Patrick Mahomes completed 29/45 (64%) for 276 yards, one touchdown, and one interception. TE Travis Kelce caught nine of 13 targets for 91 yards and a touchdown. RB Kareem Hunt rushed for 59 yards and a touchdown on 13 carries (4.5 ypc).

Bills beat Buccaneers 44-32

Buffalo QB Josh Allen was in MVP-form, accounting for 357 yards (317 passing, 40 rushing), six touchdowns, and two interceptions. He completed 19/30 (63%). WR Tyrell Shavers caught four of five targets for 90 yards and a touchdown. RB James Cook totaled 114 scrimmage yards (48 rushing, 66 receiving) and a touchdown on 19 touches (6.0 ypt).

Tampa Bay QB Baker Mayfield accounted for 218 yards (173 passing, 39 rushing), two touchdowns, and two turnovers. RB Sean Tucker totaled 140 scrimmage yards (106 rushing, 34 receiving) and three touchdowns on 21 touches (6.7 ypt).

Rams beat Seahawks 21-19

Los Angeles QB Matthew Stafford had a quiet afternoon, completing just 15/28 (54%) for 130 yards, two touchdowns, and no interceptions. WR Puka Nacua caught seven of eight targets for 75 yards. RB Kyren Williams rushed for 91 yards and a touchdown on 12 carries (7.6 ypc).

Seattle QB Sam Darnold had a nightmare performance, completing 29/44 (66%) for 279 yards, no touchdowns, and four interceptions. His top targets were WR Jaxon Smith-Njigba (9-105) and TE AJ Barner (10-70). K Jason Myers made 4/5 FG's, with the miss on a 61-yard game-winning attempt.

Panthers beat Falcons 30-27 in OT

Carolina QB Bryce Young had the best game of his career, completing 31/45 (69%) for 448 yards, three touchdowns, and no interceptions. His favorite targets were WR Tet McMillan (8-130-2) and WR Xavier Legette (4-83-1). RB Rico Dowdle totaled 100 scrimmage yards (45 rushing, 55 receiving) on 24 touches (4.2 ypt).

Atlanta QB Michael Penix (13/16, 175, 0, 0) left in the third quarter after aggravating his knee injury (bone bruise) and was replaced by Kirk Cousins (6/14, 48, 0, 0). WR Drake London caught seven of nine targets for 119 yards before exiting with a knee injury. RB Bijan Robinson totaled 143 scrimmage yards (104 rushing, 39 receiving) and two touchdowns on 27 touches (5.3 ypt).

Bears beat Vikings 19-17

Chicago QB Caleb Williams (16/32, 193, 0, 0) doesn't deserve much credit for the victory. RB De'Andre Swift rushed for 90 yards on 21 carries (4.3 ypc). K Cairo Santos made 4/5 field goals, the last one a 48-yard game-winner.

Minnesota outside of a late scoring drive, QB JJ McCarthy (16/32, 150, 1, 2) was horrible. WR Justin Jefferson caught five of nine targets for 61 yards.

49ers beat Cardinals 41-22

San Francisco QB Brock Purdy was sharp in his return, completing 19/26 (73%) for 200 yards, three touchdowns, and no interceptions. TE George Kittle caught all six of his targets for 67 yards and two touchdowns. RB Christian McCaffrey totaled 121 scrimmage yards (81 rushing, 40 receiving) and three touchdowns on 18 touches (6.7 ypt).

Arizona QB Jacoby Brissett completed an NFL record 47 passes for 452 yards, two touchdowns, and two interceptions. WR Michael Wilson caught 15 of 18 targets for 185 yards. TE Trey McBride caught ten of 11 targets for 115 yards and a touchdown.

Jaguars beat Chargers 35-6

Jacksonville QB Trevor Lawrence accounted for 162 yards (153 passing, 9 rushing), two touchdowns, and one interception. He completed 14/22 (64%). RB Bhayshul Tuten rushed for 74 yards and a touchdown on 15 carries (4.9 ypc) before leaving with an ankle injury (severity unknown). RB Travis Etienne rushed for 73 yards and two touchdowns on 19 carries (3.8 ypc).

Los Angeles QB Justin Herbert was highly ineffective, completing just 10/18 (56%) for 81 yards, no touchdowns, and an interception. WR Keenan Allen caught four of six targets for 53 yards.

Dolphins beat Commanders 16-13 in OT

Miami QB Tua Tagovailoa completed 14/20 (70%) for 171 yards, no touchdowns, and no interceptions. RB De'Von Achane totaled 165 scrimmage yards (120 rushing, 45 receiving) on 26 touches (6.3 ypt). K Riley Patterson made all three of his field goal attempts, including a 29-yard game-winner.

Washington QB Marcus Mariota accounted for 262 yards (213 passing, 49 rushing), one touchdown, and one interception. He completed 20/30 (67%). WR Deebo Samuel caught seven of eight targets for 74 yards and a touchdown. RB Chris Rodriguez rushed for 79 yards on 15 carries (5.3 ypc).

Steelers beat Bengals 34-12

Pittsburgh QB Aaron Rodgers (9/15, 116, 1, 0) left with a small fracture in his left wrist and was replaced by Mason Rudolph (12/16, 127, 1, 0). Rodgers appears likely to miss time. RB Kenneth Gainwell totaled 105 scrimmage yards (24 rushing, 81 receiving) and two touchdowns on 18 touches (5.8 ypt). The defense scored two touchdowns.

Cincinnati QB Joe Flacco struggled, completing just 23/40 (58%) for 199 yards, one touchdown, and one interception. WR Tee Higgins caught three of eight targets for 63 yards and a touchdown. RB Chase Brown totaled 127 scrimmage yards (99 rushing, 28 receiving) on 24 touches (5.3 ypt).

Ravens beat Browns 23-16

Baltimore QB Lamar Jackson (14/25, 193, 0, 2) underwhelmed. RB Derrick Henry rushed for 103 yards and a touchdown on 18 carries (5.7 ypc). TE Mark Andrews totaled 67 scrimmage yards (35 rushing, 32 receiving) and a touchdown on four touches (16.8 ypt).

Cleveland QB Dillon Gabriel (7/10, 68, 0, 0) was ruled out at halftime with a concussion and replaced by Shedeur Sanders (4/16, 47, 0, 1). WR Cedric Tillman caught three of four targets for 52 yards. DE Myles Garrett, the most dominant player in football, had four sacks.

Packers beat Giants 27-20

Green Bay QB Jordan Love (13/24, 174, 2, 0) was mostly ineffective. He missed a few snaps in the first quarter with a shoulder issue. WR Christian Watson caught four of five targets for 46 yards and two touchdowns. RB Josh Jacobs left in the first quarter with a knee injury. The initial belief is that he avoided a serious injury and may not miss time.

New York QB Jameis Winston was decent, accounting for 211 yards (201 passing, 10 rushing), one touchdown, and one interception (which ended the game). He completed 19/29 (66%). WR Isaiah Hodgins caught five of six targets for 57 yards. RB Tyrone Tracy totaled 139 scrimmage yards (88 rushing, 51 receiving) on 23 touches (6.0 ypt).

Texans beat Titans 16-13

Houston QB Davis Mills completed 26/41 (63%) for 274 yards, one touchdown, and no interceptions. WR Nico Collins caught nine of ten targets for 92 yards and a touchdown. K Matthew Wright made all three of his field goals, including a 35-yard game-winner.

Tennessee QB Cam Ward had one of his better games, accounting for 227 yards (194 passing, 33 rushing), one touchdown, and one fumble. He completed 24/37 (65%). WR Calvin Ridley suffered a season-ending broken fibula. RB Tony Pollard rushed for just 22 yards on ten carries (2.2 ypc).



New York Jets at Baltimore Ravens — OVER 44

Line: Ravens -13.5, O/U 44

Both teams enter this matchup with high-variance offensive tendencies, but the structure of this game strongly favors a higher point total than the oddsmakers imply. Baltimore's offense at home has consistently played to the script of early aggressiveness, averaging over 27 points per game at M&T Bank Stadium since September. Their offensive line — while inconsistent at times — performs significantly better at home, particularly in creating clean throwing windows on early downs. Against a Jets defense that has struggled on the road and ranks near the bottom in time-of-possession allowed, the Ravens should see more snaps and more red-zone opportunities than usual.

New York's defense has been plagued by explosive-play breakdowns. They have allowed 40+ yard completions in three straight games, and their tackling issues in space have contributed to multiple drives being extended — something Baltimore's offense has excelled at exploiting. The Jets' pass rush has shown effort but not efficiency, posting one of the league's lowest sack-to-pressure ratios over the last month. That gives Baltimore ample opportunity to attack vertically and layer in run-after-catch production.

On the other side, Baltimore's defense hasn't been as airtight as earlier in the season. Opponents have recently generated steady yardage through misdirection and off-schedule play design. The Jets' offense, though inconsistent, has been more aggressive in recent weeks, pushing the ball downfield and playing with higher tempo when trailing. This matters because the expected game script — Baltimore jumping ahead early — forces New York into a faster pace and more passing volume, both of which favor additional scoring. In addition, we get Tyrod Taylor instead of Justin Fields and that's should create more offense for the Jets.

Special teams and field position also lean toward increased total points. The Jets remain one of the most mistake-prone teams on punt coverage and kickoff alignments, repeatedly giving opponents short fields. Meanwhile, Baltimore's return units have quietly been among the league's most productive over the past month, consistently setting up drives beyond the 30-yard line.

This is a matchup where both teams are likely to run more plays than usual, where defensive fatigue becomes a factor, and where Baltimore's efficiency combined with New York's catch-up tempo drives scoring beyond the posted number. With two teams trending toward inconsistency defensively and volatility offensively, this matchup sets up well for a game that breaks into the high 40s or low 50s.

New York Giants at Detroit Lions — LIONS -10.5

Line: Lions -10.5, O/U 50

Detroit returns home after a frustrating performance in Philadelphia, and this matchup is a welcome reset. For weeks, the Lions have been inching toward a breakout home performance, and they finally catch an opponent whose profile aligns perfectly with Detroit's strengths. The Giants' offense continues to operate with minimal rhythm, ranking among the bottom five in both yards per play and early-down efficiency. Their offensive line, still dealing with injuries and reshuffling, remains weak in pass protection — a crippling flaw against Detroit's front, which generates consistent pressure up the middle.

The Lions' defensive formula at home has been textbook: stop the run first, force long third downs,

then send additional pressure from disguised looks. Opponents have averaged just 16 points per game at Ford Field over the last month, and the Giants do not have the personnel to consistently challenge Detroit vertically. Even when New York has manufactured explosive plays, they have repeatedly failed to convert drives into touchdowns — one of the league's worst red-zone offenses on the road.

Offensively, Detroit's path is clearer. They excel at moving the chains with short-to-intermediate passing and pairing that with a punishing ground game. The Giants' defense has allowed over 320 yards in five of their last six outings, and their inability to stop the run has created major imbalance. Detroit should own time of possession and create a steady flow of manageable third downs, setting up long, methodical scoring drives.

The real separator here is Detroit's offensive consistency at home. They average multiple touchdowns in nearly every home game and rarely stall in the red zone. The Giants lack the pass-rush depth and linebacker discipline to slow down Detroit's play-action sequencing. With the Lions playing angry, rested, and in a dome environment where their offense thrives, this matchup projects as one-way traffic.

Turnovers and field position also heavily favor Detroit. The Giants remain one of the league's most turnover-prone teams, while Detroit's home turnover margin is among the best in the NFC. Detroit should pull ahead early, control tempo, and extend the lead steadily through the second half.

TAKE: LIONS -10.5

Tampa Bay Buccaneers at Los Angeles Rams — UNDER 50

Line: Rams -6.5, O/U 50

The Rams return home after a draining divisional win, and this matchup projects as a defensive-tilted contest rather than the shootout some might expect from these teams' reputations. Los Angeles has quietly shifted into a more controlled offensive identity over the past month, leaning heavily on the run and reducing high-risk throws. This has shortened games and reduced total possessions. Meanwhile, Tampa Bay enters with an offense that has shown flashes but remains inconsistent across all four quarters — especially on the road.

The Buccaneers' defense has been far more competitive outdoors than indoors, and they match up well with Los Angeles' strengths. Tampa Bay continues to produce a strong red-zone performance profile, using pressure on early downs to force third-and-long situations. The Rams prefer structured drives, and when forced behind schedule, their production drops sharply. With the Buccaneers allowing only a handful of explosive plays over their last several games, the Rams may have to string together long drives without errors — something difficult to do in the red zone against a disciplined unit.

Los Angeles' defense is the true driver for this under. Their coverage discipline and tackling consistency have improved dramatically, and they have held opponents under 23 points in most recent outings. Tampa Bay, while capable of generating occasional big plays, has struggled to finish drives and has leaned heavily on field goals. Meanwhile, the Rams' pass rush should create disruption, forcing Tampa Bay into a one-dimensional approach that limits their scoring ceiling.

This game also features two teams that prefer to play slower when protecting leads, and the situational tendencies suggest extended drives and reduced total plays. With both teams trending toward conservative play-calling and defensive reliability, this total sits too high given the expected tempo and matchup dynamics.

TAKE: UNDER 50

Cleveland Browns at Las Vegas Raiders — Raiders -3

Line: Raiders -3, O/U 36

This matchup features two teams trending in opposite directions, and the differences have become especially visible over the last three weeks. The Raiders continue to play with renewed energy and discipline at home, leaning into a defensive identity that has kept opponents uncomfortable and forced them into predictable passing situations. Their front has quietly been one of the most physical units in the league during this recent stretch, consistently winning early downs and limiting rushing efficiency. Against a Cleveland offense that has struggled to stay ahead of the chains, that edge becomes even more magnified.

Cleveland's offensive issues remain significant. The protection breakdowns have mounted, and the quarterback play has become increasingly volatile as the season has progressed. Bad sacks, stalled drives, and limited explosiveness have made it nearly impossible for the Browns to sustain scoring bursts on the road. It's also worth noting that turnovers have been a recurring problem — strip sacks, tipped interceptions, and botched exchanges have tilted several recent games. Traveling into one of the toughest environments the AFC has to offer, with an offense in turmoil and limited rhythm, is not an encouraging formula.

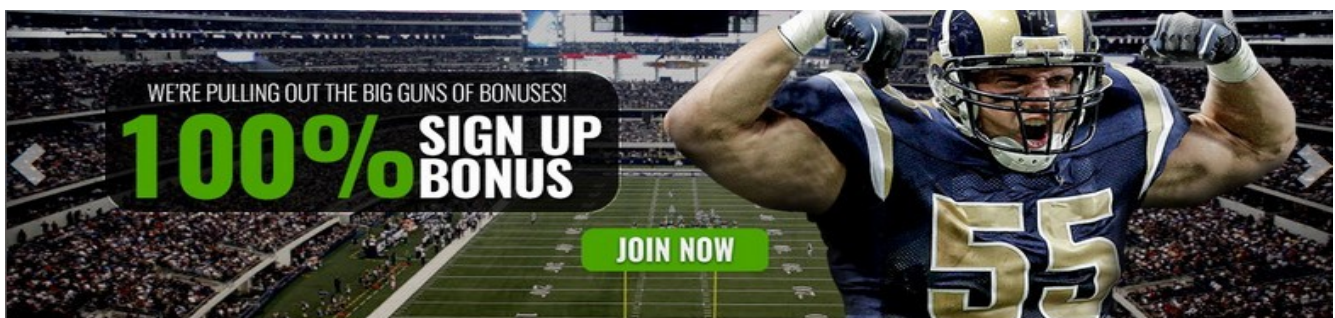
The Raiders, meanwhile, have found a style that suits them: mistake-free football, relentless defensive effort, and efficient drives that flip field position. Their coverage communication has improved dramatically, allowing them to take away first reads and force opponents into contested throws. Cleveland's passing game has not shown the consistency to beat tight coverage or handle pressure without error. Once the Browns fall behind schedule, the Raiders' defense is built to capitalize.

Offensively, Las Vegas doesn't need to be explosive to control this matchup — they simply need to be steady. Their run game is generating enough efficiency to stay balanced, and their passing attack has avoided the backbreaking mistakes that plagued the early part of their season. Cleveland's defense is still talented, but the unit has been carrying too much weight, and second-half fatigue has become evident in recent weeks. Extended drives by the Raiders will chip away at that group over four quarters.

Special teams and situational discipline also favor the Raiders. Cleveland continues to give opponents critical extra chances through penalties on late downs, while Las Vegas has tightened its operation in all three phases. In a low-total environment where every possession carries heightened value, the home team holds the advantage.

This sets up as a physical game with field position dictating much of the flow. Las Vegas has been the far more reliable team at home and has the matchup edges, especially at quarterback, to close out a tight, grinding AFC contest and cover the spread.

PRO FOOTBALL QUICK PICKS

Buffalo Bills at Houston Texans (Thursday)

Line: Bills -5.5, O/U 44

Houston's defense has been tough at home, holding recent visitors below 20 points while generating steady pressure with a four-man rush. The Texans also shorten games with a balanced, ball-control approach that limits total possessions. Buffalo's offense is explosive but has been inconsistent on the road and vulnerable to negative plays when forced into long fields. In a lower-possession matchup, asking them to win by margin is a big ask. TAKE: UNDER 44

Pittsburgh Steelers at Chicago Bears

Line: Bears -3, O/U 45

Chicago's run game and improved tackling have stabilized both sides of the ball, especially at Soldier Field. Pittsburgh comes in off a physically demanding stretch and has struggled to sustain offense on the road. The Bears' ability to control tempo and avoid big defensive busts gives them the edge in a tight, lower-scoring game.

TAKE: BEARS -3

New England Patriots at Cincinnati Bengals

Line: Patriots -9, O/U 49

New England's defense has carried them, but the offense has been methodical and conservative away from home. Cincinnati's defensive front is playing with more discipline and has generated timely takeaways in recent weeks. With the Patriots leaning on the ground game and clock control, the door stays open for Cincinnati to hang around all afternoon.

TAKE: BENGALS +9

Minnesota Vikings at Green Bay Packers

Line: Packers -6.5, O/U 41

Green Bay's defense at Lambeau has been quietly strong, limiting explosives and tightening up in the red zone. Minnesota's passing game remains erratic, and repeated miscues on third down have killed promising drives. With the Packers' crowd and defensive front dictating tempo, this sets up well for a controlled home win.

TAKE: PACKERS -6.5

Indianapolis Colts at Kansas City Chiefs

Line: Chiefs -3.5, O/U 50

Kansas City continues to win with defense and situational precision, sitting near the top of the league in third-down and red-zone stops. The Colts rely heavily on chunk gains, but Arrowhead's

environment and the Chiefs' disciplined coverage make those harder to find. If Kansas City avoids turnovers, their combination of pass rush and home-field advantage should be enough to clear this short number.

TAKE: CHIEFS -3.5

Seattle Seahawks at Tennessee Titans

Line: Seahawks -13.5, O/U 40

Seattle clearly owns the talent edge, but their offense has been inconsistent on the road and prone to stalled drives. Tennessee, despite a poor record, continues to compete on defense and has recently tightened up against the run. With the Titans dragging opponents into slower, physical games, this double-digit spread feels inflated for the expected pace.

TAKE: TITANS +13.5

Jacksonville Jaguars at Arizona Cardinals

Line: Jaguars -2.5, O/U 48

Arizona's effort level remains high, and the passing game has shown signs of life with more vertical shots and tempo. Jacksonville mixes impressive stretches with sudden breakdowns on both sides of the ball, making them unreliable as road favorites. In front of a home crowd that's still engaged, the Cardinals have enough offense to keep this within a field goal – and potentially steal it outright.

TAKE: CARDINALS +2.5

Cleveland Browns at Las Vegas Raiders

Line: Raiders -3, O/U 36

Cleveland's offense continues to sputter, especially when forced into obvious passing situations behind a shaky line. Las Vegas has leaned on defense, field position, and just enough offense at home to grind out results. In a low-total environment where every possession matters, the Raiders' stability and home edge point to another close but favorable result.

TAKE: RAIDERS -3

Philadelphia Eagles at Dallas Cowboys

Line: Eagles -3.5, O/U 50

Philadelphia's identity is built in the trenches, and they typically control both lines of scrimmage in matchups like this. Dallas has more volatility, with the offense looking great in spurts but stalling when protection breaks down. The Eagles' edge in time of possession and situational football makes them the more trustworthy side over four quarters.

TAKE: EAGLES -3.5

Atlanta Falcons at New Orleans Saints

Line: Saints -1.5, O/U 40

Both teams have had trouble stringing together consistent offense, but New Orleans has looked more organized at home. Atlanta's defense continues to give up key plays in coverage, particularly on third down. With a slight edge on special teams and home-field energy, the Saints are better positioned to win a grind-it-out divisional game.

TAKE: SAINTS -1.5

Carolina Panthers at San Francisco 49ers

Line: 49ers -6.5, O/U 48

San Francisco's defense has tightened dramatically in recent weeks, and their front is positioned to control the line of scrimmage against a Carolina offense that struggles to protect consistently. The 49ers' physical rushing attack should dictate pace and help create manageable third downs throughout the afternoon. Carolina can produce occasional explosive plays, but sustaining drives on this defense has been a recurring challenge. With home-field energy and matchup advantages in both trenches. But, the Panthers offense came alive and this one is tougher than most think.
