NFL LANDSCAPE:

Broncos beat Commanders 27-26 in OT

Denver (10-2) - QB Bo Nix completed 29/45 (64%) for 321 yards, one touchdown, and one interception. His top targets were TE Evan Engram (6-79) and WR Courtland Sutton (5-62-1). RB RJ Harvey totaled 62 scrimmage yards (35 rushing, 27 receiving) and two touchdowns on 16 touches (3.9 ypt).

Washington (3-9) - QB Marcus Mariota left it all out on the field, accounting for 349 yards (294 passing, 55 rushing), two touchdowns, and an interception. His top targets were TE Zach Ertz (10-106) and WR Terry McLaurin (7-96-1). WR Treyton Burks made the best catch in the NFL this season. The Commanders failed to convert a game-winning two-point conversion in overtime.

Panthers beat Rams 31-28 - Carolina (7-6) - QB Bryce Young was highly effective, completing 15/20 (75%) for 206 yards, three touchdowns, and no interceptions. WR Jalen Coker caught four of six targets for 74 yards and a touchdown. RB Chuba Hubbard totaled 124 scrimmage yards (83 rushing, 41 receiving) and a touchdown on 19 touches (6.5 ypt). The defense had a fumble recovery and two interceptions — one of them a pick-six by CB Mike Jackson.

Los Angeles (9-3) - QB Matthew Stafford (18/28, 243, 2, 2) had a down performance by his standards. WR Davante Adams caught four of five targets for 58 yards and two touchdowns. RB Blake Corum rushed for 81 yards and a touchdown on seven carries (11.6 ypc).

Texans beat Colts 20-16 - Houston (7-5) - QB CJ Stroud completed 22/35 (63%) for 276 yards, no touchdowns, and an interception. His top targets were WR Nico Collins (5-98) and WR Jayden Higgins (5-65). The Texans' elite defense limited the Colts to just 281 total yards and 3/10 on third downs.

Indianapolis (8-4) - QB Daniel Jones, who is playing through a fracture in his fibula, completed just 14/27 (52%) for 201 yards, two touchdowns, and no interceptions. WR Alec Pierce caught four of five targets for 78 yards and a touchdown. RB Jonathan Taylor totaled 121 scrimmage yards (85 rushing, 36 receiving) on 24 touches (5.0 ypt).

Jaguars beat Titans 25-3 - Jacksonville (8-4) - QB Trevor Lawrence accounted for 254 yards (229 passing, 25 rushing), two touchdowns, and no interceptions. He completed 16/27 (59%). His top targets were WR Jakobi Meyers (6-90-1) and TE Brenton Strange (3-45-1). DE Josh Hines-Allen had two sacks.

Tennessee (1-11) - QB Cam Ward (24/38, 141, 0, 0) had a rough outing. TE Gunnar Helm caught six

of seven targets for 23 yards.

Buccaneers beat Cardinals 20-17

Tampa Bay (7-5) - QB Baker Mayfield (18/28, 194, 1, 0) was somewhat effective playing through his shoulder injury. WR Chris Godwin caught three of five targets for 78 yards. RB Bucky Irving totaled 81 scrimmage yards (61 rushing, 20 receiving) and a touchdown on 19 touches (4.3 ypt).

Arizona (3-9) - QB Jacoby Brissett (29/40, 301, 2, 1) had another high statistical output. His top targets were TE Trey McBride (8-82-1) and WR Marvin Harrison Jr. (6-69). RB Bam Knight totaled 98 scrimmage yards (62 rushing, 36 receiving) and a touchdown on 14 touches (7.0 ypt).

Bills beat Steelers 26-7

Buffalo (8-4) - QB Josh Allen accounted for 161 yards (123 passing, 38 rushing), two touchdowns, and an interception. He completed 15/23 (65%). RB James Cook totaled 177 yards (144 rushing, 33 receiving) on 35 touches (5.1 ypt). CB Christian Benford had a pick-six.

Pittsburgh (6-6) - QB Aaron Rodgers was not good, completing just 10/21 (48%) for 117 yards, no touchdowns, and no interceptions. He left the game briefly with a nose injury. RB Jaylen Warren rushed for 35 yards and a touchdown on 10 carries (3.5 ypc).

Chargers beat Raiders 31-14

Los Angeles (8-4) - QB Justin Herbert completed 15/20 (75%) for 151 yards, two touchdowns, and one interception. He fractured a bone in his left hand in the first quarter, but only missed a few snaps. Herbert will have surgery on the hand today and does not expect to miss time. WR Ladd McConkey caught four of six targets for 39 yards and a touchdown. RB Kimani Vidal rushed for 126 yards and a touchdown on 25 carries (5.0 ypc).

Las Vegas (2-10) - QB Geno Smith completed 18/23 (78%) for 165 yards, two touchdowns, and an interception. TE Brock Bowers caught all four of his targets for 63 yards and two touchdowns.

Seahawks beat Vikings 26-0

Seattle (9-3) - QB Sam Darnold (14/26, 128, 0, 0) was ineffective. RB Zach Charbonnet rushed for 52 yards and a touchdown on 14 carries (3.7 ypc). The defense had four sacks, two forced fumbles, and four interceptions (one of them a pick-six).

Minnesota (4-8) - QB Max Brosmer had a nightmarish debut, completing 19/30 (63%) for 126 yards, no touchdowns, and four interceptions. TE TJ Hockenson caught all six of his targets for 59 yards.

49ers beat Browns 26-8

San Francisco (9-4) - QB Brock Purdy accounted for 174 yards (168 passing, 4 rushing), two touchdowns, and no turnovers. He completed 16/29 (55%). His top targets were TE George Kittle (4-67) and WR Jauan Jennings (4-39-1). RB Christian McCaffrey totaled 74 scrimmage yards (53 rushing, 21 receiving) and a touchdown on 24 touches (3.1 ypt).

Cleveland (3-9) - QB Shedeur Sanders completed 16/25 (64%) for 149 yards, one touchdown, and no interceptions. His top targets were TE Harold Fannin (3-43-1) and WR Jerry Jeudy (3-26). RB Quinshon Judkins totaled 109 scrimmage yards (91 rushing, 18 receiving) on 26 touches (4.2 ypt).

Jets beat Falcons 27-24

New York (3-9) - QB Tyrod Taylor accounted for 216 yards (172 passing, 44 rushing), two touchdowns, and no interceptions. He completed 19/33 (58%). WR Adonai Mitchell had a breakout game, catching eight of 12 targets for 102 yards and a touchdown. RB Breece Hall rushed for 68 yards and a touchdown on 19 carries (3.6 ypc). K Nick Folk made a game-winning 56-yard field goal as time expired.

Atlanta (4-8) - QB Kirk Cousins completed 21/33 (64%) for 234 yards, one touchdown, and no interceptions. TE Kyle Pitts caught seven of eight targets for 82 yards. RB Bijan Robinson was in All-Pro form, totaling 193 scrimmage yards (142 rushing, 51 receiving) and a touchdown on 28 touches (6.9 ypt).

Dolphins beat Saints 21-17

Miami (5-7) - QB Tua Tagovailoa struggled, completing just 12/23 (52%) for 157 yards, no touchdowns, and an interception. RB De'Von Achane rushed for 134 yards and a touchdown on 22 carries (6.1 ypc). The defense recorded four sacks, an interception, and a fumble recovery.

New Orleans (2-10) - QB Tyler Shough showed some promise, completing 26/38 (68%) for 239 yards, two touchdowns, and an interception. His top targets were WR DeV Vaughn Vele (8-93-1) and WR Chris Olave (4-47-1). RB Devin Neal totaled 69 scrimmage yards (47 rushing, 22 receiving) on 17 touches (4.1 ypt).

Packers beat Lions 31-24 (Thanksgiving)

Green Bay (8-3-1) - QB Jordan Love had a big performance, completing 18/30 (60%) for 234 yards, four touchdowns, and no interceptions. His top targets were WR Dontayvion Wicks (6-94-2) and WR Christian Watson (4-80-1). DE Micah Parsons had eight tackles, 2.5 sacks, three tackles for loss, four QB hits, and eight pressures.

Detroit (7-5) - QB Jared Goff completed 20/26 (77%) for 256 yards, two touchdowns, and no interceptions. WR Amon-Ra St. Brown left in the first quarter with an ankle sprain. He's expected to miss a few games. WR Jameson Williams caught seven of ten targets for 144 yards and a touchdown.

Cowboys beat Chiefs 31-28 (Thanksgiving)

Dallas (6-5-1) - QB Dak Prescott was excellent, completing 27/39 (69%) for 320 yards, two touchdowns, and an interception. His top targets were WR CeeDee Lamb (7-112-1) and WR George Pickens (6-88). RB Javonte Williams totaled 80 scrimmage yards (59 rushing, 21 receiving) and a touchdown on 20 touches (4.0 ypt).

Kansas City (6-6) - QB Patrick Mahomes completed 23/34 (68%) for 261 yards, four touchdowns, and no interceptions. WR Rashee Rice caught eight of 12 targets for 92 yards and two touchdowns. The defense did not record a sack.

Bengals beat Ravens 32-14 (Thanksgiving)

Cincinnati (4-8) - QB Joe Burrow, in his first game since Week 2, completed 24/46 (52%) for 261 yards, two touchdowns, and no interceptions. WR Ja'Marr Chase caught seven of 14 targets for 110 yards. RB Chase Brown totaled 113 scrimmage yards (78 rushing, 35 receiving) on 22 touches (5.1

ypt).

Baltimore (6-6) - QB Lamar Jackson was ineffective, completing just 17/32 (53%) for 246 yards, no touchdowns, and an interception. He hasn't scored a touchdown in his last three games. RB Derrick Henry was a bright spot, totaling 104 scrimmage yards (60 rushing, 44 receiving) and a touchdown on 11 touches (9.5 ypt).

Bears beat Eagles 24-15 (Black Friday)

Chicago (9-3) - QB Caleb Williams did not play well, completing just 17/36 (47%) for 154 yards, one touchdown, and one interception. He averaged just 4.3 yards per pass attempt. RB Kyle Monangai rushed for 130 yards and a touchdown on 22 carries (5.9 ypc). RB D'Andre Swift rushed for 125 yards and a touchdown on 18 carries (6.9 ypc).

Philadelphia (8-4) - QB Jalen Hurts accounted for 261 yards (230 passing, 31 rushing), two touchdowns, and two turnovers. He completed 19/34 (56%). WR AJ Brown (10-132-2) was a bright spot. The defense allowed 281 rushing yards on 47 carries (6.0 ypc).

Patriots beat Giants 33-15 (MNF)

Patriots (11-2) First to 11: The Patriots are the first team in the NFL to reach 11 wins this season. They currently hold the No. 1 seed in the AFC.

MVP? Drake Maye had another strong performance, completing 24 of 31 passes (77%) for 282 yards, two touchdowns, and no interceptions. He left the field to MVP chants. TreVeyon Henderson totaled 86 scrimmage yards (67 rushing, 19 receiving) on 14 touches (6.1 ypt).

NY Giants (2-11): Jaxon Dart had a relatively quiet night, completing 17 of 24 passes (71%) for 139 yards, one touchdown, and no interceptions. Tracy Hurt: Tyrone Tracy was carted off with a hip injury. Devin Singletary rushed for 68 yards and a touchdown on 12 carries (5.7 ypc).

The Patriots haven't lost since Sept. 21. The Giants (2-11) are on the opposite end of the spectrum, with their last win coming on Oct. 9 — though they nearly beat the Lions last week.

TAMPA BAY -8.5 over New Orleans

Tampa Bay returns home in a spot that sharp bettors love to attack: an explosive offense facing a New Orleans team that continues to show glaring structural problems on both sides of the ball. The Saints' defensive identity for years has been built around discipline and physicality, but that hasn't been the case this season. They've repeatedly given up free possessions through blown protections, turnovers in their own territory, and long stretches where the offense can't sustain drives. That combination is lethal when stepping into a matchup against a Buccaneers team that excels at producing short fields and converting them into points.

A major red flag for New Orleans is how poorly they handled Miami's pass rush last week. The Dolphins barely had to disguise their pressure to disrupt New Orleans' timing routes. Tampa Bay brings a different style — not exotic, but brutally efficient — creating immediate penetration without needing to send extra bodies. That front has feasted on mistake-prone offenses all year, and New Orleans fits that profile perfectly. Their quarterback play has been erratic, their red-zone efficiency remains bottom-tier, and their offensive line has repeatedly struggled to keep games on schedule.

On the other side, Tampa Bay showed last week why they remain the class of the NFC South. Even while managing injuries at key positions, they controlled the flow of the game, stayed balanced, and consistently flipped the field with well-timed shot plays. They're also far more comfortable at home, where their tempo and spacing concepts open up clean throwing windows. New Orleans' secondary has been leaking explosives at alarming rates, and they have not tackled well in space — a dangerous flaw against a Tampa offense that thrives on yards after contact.

There is also a motivational edge: Tampa Bay is in full control of the division chase, while the Saints are trending the wrong direction with injuries, turnover issues, and inconsistent coaching decisions that repeatedly put them behind the sticks. When you combine New Orleans' offensive volatility with Tampa Bay's advantage in the trenches and special teams, the Buccaneers not only hold the matchup edges — they hold the consistency edge, the momentum edge, and the situational edge.

This is exactly the type of game where Tampa Bay stretches its lead late. New Orleans isn't built to trade scores or play catch-up, and their recent road performances show the same pattern: a few early mistakes snowball into second-half desperation drives that rarely lead to points.

TAKE: TAMPA BAY -8.5

WASHINGTON +1.5 over Minnesota

This matchup is a classic case of two teams trending in opposite directions. Washington's identity has become increasingly clear over the past month: they win by controlling the line of scrimmage, dictating tempo, and forcing opponents into predictable passing situations. Minnesota, meanwhile, has been forced into a revolving-door quarterback situation, and their offense has not handled pressure or adversity well. That's a dangerous combination against a Washington defense that's been quietly dominating the early downs.

Minnesota's biggest problem isn't just turnover volume — it's how those turnovers happen. They're rarely deep shots on third-and-long. More often, they're self-inflicted mistakes: forced throws, hesitations that lead to sacks, or miscommunications in the middle of the field. Those mistakes are magnified inside U.S. Bank Stadium, where fan impatience has begun to mount, and the offense presses at the slightest adversity. Washington is exactly the type of opponent that exploits that emotional volatility. Their defensive front disrupts timing without needing exotic pressures, and their

back-end pursuit limits yards after the catch.

Offensively, Washington comes into this matchup playing its most complete football of the season. The run game has stabilized, the short-passing rhythm has returned, and they're no longer abandoning the ground attack when trailing early. Minnesota's run defense has been inconsistent, allowing chunk plays at the second level and struggling to get off blocks on perimeter runs. When Washington controls possession, their offense becomes substantially more dangerous, allowing them to run action-based concepts that take advantage of Minnesota's predictability.

Washington also holds a massive situational edge. Minnesota's defense wears down late, particularly after long fields or sudden-change situations. Meanwhile, Washington has been excellent at generating fourth-quarter stops, holding three straight opponents scoreless in the final five minutes. In a game lined near pick'em, that late-game defensive stability is often the hidden difference between a cover and a collapse.

Minnesota's turnover issues, quarterback inconsistency, and defensive fatigue all point to the same outcome. Washington's physicality and stability should take control by the middle of the second half, and from there the matchup tilts entirely in their favor.

TAKE: WASHINGTON -1.5

SEATTLE-ATLANTA UNDER 44

This total sets up as one of the strongest under spots on the board. Seattle's defense enters this game playing its most disciplined stretch of the season, and their ability to limit explosive plays has fundamentally changed the way their matchups flow. They're no longer giving up cheap yardage on early downs, they're tackling in space, and they've tightened up in the red zone. That's bad news for an Atlanta offense that has been wildly inconsistent and heavily reliant on long plays or short fields to reach the mid-20s.

Atlanta's passing game has been particularly volatile. On standard downs, they struggle to create separation and often settle for short completions that yield little after contact. Against a Seattle defense that rallies to the football and rarely misses open-field tackles, those underneath throws become drive-killers. Atlanta also remains one of the least efficient red-zone teams in the league, often stalling inside the 20 due to predictable play-calling and poor spacing.

Offensively for Seattle, the matchup doesn't suggest a shootout either. The Seahawks tend to play conservatively on the road, leaning on ball control and field position rather than tempo. Their methodology shifts to a possession gameplan: avoid giveaways, punt when necessary, and rely on the defense to tilt the field. That works perfectly against an Atlanta defense that is soft between the 20s but surprisingly resilient inside the red zone.

Another key factor: Atlanta slows every game down with long huddles, extended play clocks, and methodical run-heavy sequences. They consistently reduce the number of total possessions, creating ideal conditions for an under. Against a Seattle team that doesn't mind playing slow and grinding through 10-play drives, the overall rhythm of this matchup should be deliberate and physical, not explosive.

Unless one side benefits from non-offensive touchdowns or unexpected short fields, the structure of both offenses points toward a low-possession, low-variance game where exiting the low 40s becomes difficult. Both defenses match up well against the opposing offenses' tendencies, and both coaching staffs lean conservative with a lead.

TAKE: UNDER 44 (SEATTLE-ATLANTA)

DENVER -7.5 over Las Vegas

Denver enters this AFC West matchup in a spot that wise guys love: a road favorite with a dominant defensive advantage facing a Raiders team that continues to struggle with protection, consistency, and finishing drives. The Broncos' defense has been suffocating opponents for a month straight, and they match up extremely well with a Las Vegas offense that relies on timing, quick throws, and rhythm — three areas that Denver's pass rush disrupts at the highest level.

The Raiders' offensive line has battled communication issues all year, especially against fronts that disguise post-snap movement. Denver thrives in exactly that area. Their edge pressure has forced multiple quarterbacks into hurried throws, sacks, and stalled red-zone possessions. The Broncos force teams to earn every yard in long, methodical drives — something the Raiders simply haven't been able to do. Their turnover margin remains poor, their penalties stall drives, and their third-down conversion rate has hovered near the bottom of the league.

Denver's offense, meanwhile, continues to evolve. They've found stability in their run game, and their passing structure has become efficient and controlled. They're not relying on deep shots; instead, they're grinding out drives, protecting the football, and winning the field-position battle. Against a Raiders defense that has struggled to defend the run and has allowed opponents to control time of possession, that's a recipe for sustained drives and scoreboard pressure.

The most important mismatch is situational football. Denver is one of the league's best fourth-quarter defenses, allowing almost nothing late when protecting a lead. Las Vegas, by contrast, fades in the second half — particularly when trailing. Their offensive predictability becomes glaring, they abandon balance, and opponents tee off on their protection.

Denver also carries a mental and emotional advantage. They've been playing with playoff urgency for weeks, while Las Vegas continues to oscillate between promising spurts and long droughts of offensive stagnation. The Broncos' discipline, consistency, and defensive physicality should tilt this matchup heavily in their favor.

The game script points one way: Denver builds a lead, controls the clock, and forces the Raiders into a pass-heavy chase mode — exactly where their weaknesses become impossible to hide.

Dallas at Detroit - 3

Detroit matches up with real leverage here. Their trench play has been far more consistent at home, and the offense typically finds rhythm indoors where tempo is controlled. Dallas has struggled to finish drives late, and their secondary has shown cracks against physical passing attacks, especially when forced into high-possession games. Lions carry the advantage in red-zone efficiency and overall snap control.

TAKE: DETROIT -3

Pittsburgh at Baltimore - 6

Baltimore's defensive structure is built to squeeze limited passing teams, and Pittsburgh remains heavily dependent on field position to stay competitive. The Ravens hold the edge in early-down success rate and should dictate tempo by forcing long-yardage situations. Pittsburgh has been vulnerable on the road in these grind-style matchups, especially as games wear on.

TAKE: BALTIMORE -6

Miami at NY Jets – Total 41

Both teams have shown volatility on defense, and their offensive styles push the pace. Miami's speed stresses secondaries, while the Jets' ground game creates sustaining drives that extend snaps. With special teams creating hidden yardage and both clubs susceptible to explosive plays, this number sits too low relative to likely possessions.

TAKE: OVER 41

Indianapolis at Jacksonville - Total 49

This shapes into a tighter, lower-variance game than the market expects. Both teams trend toward short-area passing and ball-control structure when facing divisional familiarity. Red-zone efficiency dips sharply in these matchups, and neither defense gives up many chunk plays in the air. The Under holds the clearest mathematical edge.

TAKE: UNDER 49

Tennessee at Cleveland – 4.5

Cleveland's scoring ceiling shrinks when forced into methodical drives, and Tennessee's front has been stout enough to keep this within a one-score script. The Titans typically raise their physicality in these mid-season cold-weather games, narrowing possessions and keeping margins tight.

Cleveland's inconsistent offensive rhythm makes this number heavy.

TAKE: TENNESSEE +4.5

Chicago at Green Bay - Total 46

This matchup consistently creates inflated snap counts. Green Bay pushes pace at home, and Chicago's ground efficiency keeps chains moving enough to create possessions. Defensive breakdowns have been common for both sides, particularly on explosive plays. With a high combined edge, the Over is the correct angle.

TAKE: OVER 46

LA Rams – 7.5 at Arizona

The Rams' balance on both sides of the ball gives them the superior path to control. Arizona's defensive inconsistencies show up most against well-structured offenses that avoid negative plays. Rams should own situational football and red-zone conversion.

TAKE: LA RAMS -7.5

Cincinnati at Buffalo - 6

Buffalo often wins with margin only when game flow favors early leads and turnovers. Cincinnati's passing rhythm and late-game efficiency travel well, and their defensive front is built to disrupt long-developing plays. With a strong numerical edge, the road dog is live throughout.

TAKE: CINCINNATI +6

Houston at Kansas City- Total 42

Both teams trend toward conservative adjustments in tight AFC matchups. Kansas City has leaned on defensive stability, while Houston's recent approach favors measured, clock-draining drives. Explosive plays may be limited, keeping scoring compressed.

TAKE: UNDER 42

Philadelphia at LA Chargers - Total 41

Philadelphia carries strong structural edges across both trenches. Their ability to dictate pace and protect drives positions them well against a Chargers team that has struggled to close halves. Expect the more physical team to control possession and deliver consistent scoring opportunities.

TAKE: UNDER 41
